This guide identifies Century Community College courses that can prepare students to transfer into undergraduate programs at the College of Education & Human Development (CEHD) at the University of Minnesota-Twin Cities campus.

Application process

The application process has 2 steps. First, you need to apply to the University of Minnesota. You can do this online at <http://admissions.tc.umn.edu/admissioninfo/trans.html> . Along with this application, you need to submit the supplemental materials to the Office of Admissions. You can find directions for completing these materials at <http://www.cehd.umn.edu/students/Undergrad/Transfer/>

In order to have your application considered for the admission, both the U of M application AND supplemental materials must be completed

The priority deadlines to apply:

Spring semester: October 1st

Fall semester: February 1st

The final deadlines to apply:

Spring semester: December 1st

Fall semester: June 1st

Many majors fill with applications submitted on or before the priority deadlines. We strongly encourage submission of applications by this deadline!

Business and Marketing Education

Admission to this major requires a minimum 2.00 GPA (2.5 for teaching track) and 30 semester credits completed or in progress at the time of application. The following courses are strongly recommended, but not required, prior to admission.

First-Year Writing

- ENGL 1021 – Composition I

Mathematics: (*choose one*)

- MATH 1025 – Statistics **or**
- MATH 1061 – College Algebra I **or**
- Other college-level math

Public Speaking:

- COMM 1021 – Fundamentals of Public Speaking

Social Science:

- ECON 1021 – Macroeconomics **or** ECON 1023 – Microeconomics (Pre-licensure students take both courses)
- PSYC 1020 – General Psychology

Early Childhood Education Foundations

All courses in content area 1 and at least half of the courses in content areas 2-6 must be completed or in progress at the time of application. Admission to this major also requires a minimum 2.50 GPA, 60 semester credits completed or in progress.

Content Area 1: Basic Requirements

- PSYC 1020 – General Psychology
- PSYC 2043 – Child Development
- Recommended, but not required: one year of college-level second language

Content Area 2: Language and Communication

- Communication (*choose one*)
 - COMM 1021 – Fundamentals of Public Speaking **or**
 - COMM 1031 – Interpersonal Communication **or**
 - COMM 1051 – Intercultural Communication
- Students must also complete one course in the structure of the English language (linguistics) and one course in language development at the University of Minnesota

Content Area 3: Mathematics

- MATH 1025 – Statistics **and**
- MATH 1061 – College Algebra I

Content Area 4: Science

- Biological science with lab: (*choose one*)
 - BIOL 1020 –Biology Concepts **or**
 - BIOL 1025 – Field Biology **or**
 - BIOL 1026 –Plants and Society **or**
 - BIOL 1041 – Principles of Biology I
- Physical science with lab: (*choose one*)
 - CHEM 1020 – Chemistry Concepts **or**
 - CHEM 1041 – Principles of Chemistry I **or**
 - ESCI 1020 – Earth Science **or**
 - ESCI 1030 – Physical Geology **or**
 - ESCI 1050 – Introduction to Meteorology **or**
 - ESCI 1060 – Introduction to Oceanography **or**

- PHYS 1041 – General Physics I **or**
- PHYS 1081 – Introductory Physics I **or**
- Select one science elective with or without a lab **or** HLTH 1070 – Nutrition

Content Area 5: Social Studies

- American History: (*choose one*)
 - HIST 1031 – United State to 1877 **or**
 - HIST 1032 – United States since 1877
- Human Geography: (*choose one*)
 - GEOG 1023 – Human/Cultural Geography **or**
 - GEOG 1031 – World Regional Geography
- Cultural Pluralism/Diversity in the U.S. : (*choose one*)
 - SOC 2051 – Sociology of Race and Ethnicity **or**
 - SOC 1020 – Introduction to Sociology

Content Area 6: Communication Arts and Literature

- First year writing:
 - ENGL 1021 – Composition I
- American literature: (*choose one*)
 - ENGL 2011 – American Literature: Colonial to Civil War **or**
 - ENGL 2012 – American Literature: Civil War to present **or**
 - ENGL 2013 – African American Literature **or**
- Children’s Literature
 - Take this at the U of M
- One elective from the following areas is required: art, dance, music, philosophy, or theater.

Elementary Education Foundations

At least half of the courses in content areas 1-6 should be completed or in progress at the time of application. Admission to this major also requires a minimum 2.50 GPA and 60 semester credits completed or in progress at the time of application. Students must also complete at least 35 hours of classroom experience in a K-6 public classroom setting during regular school days/hours; this experience may be paid or unpaid.

*****The course requirements for elementary education and the specialty areas are under review by the MN Board of Teaching. While we encourage you to develop specialty areas, these areas may not be required for licensure in the future. Please stay in contact with the CEHD advisors who will have updated information*****

Content Area 1: Basic Requirements

- PSYC 1020 – General Psychology
- MUSC 1030 – Fundamentals of Music
- EDUC 1045 – Orientation to Education
- Students must also complete one course in the structure of the English language (linguistics) at the University of Minnesota.

Content Area 2: Mathematics

- College algebra
 - MATH 1061 – College Algebra I
- Statistical reasoning, logic, or calculus: (*choose one*)
 - MATH 1025 – Statistics **or**
 - MATH 1081 – Single Variable Calculus I **or**
 - PHIL 1041 – Introduction to Logic
- Students must also complete Mathematics for Elementary Teachers I and II at the U of M

Content Area 3: Science

- Biology with lab: (*choose one*)
 - BIOL 1020 –Biology Concepts **or**
 - BIOL 1041 – Principles of Biology I
- Physics for teachers: Take this at the U of M after admission
- Earth science with lab: (*choose one*)
 - ESCI 1020 – Earth Science **or**
 - ESCI 1030 – Physical Geology
- Select one science elective with or without a lab **or** HLTH 1070 – Nutrition

Content Area 4: Social Studies

- American History
 - HIST 1032 – United States since 1877
- Non-U.S. history elective: (*choose one*)
 - HIST 1021 – Western Civilization: From Antiquity to the 18th Century **or**
 - HIST 1022 – Western Civilization: From the 18th Century to the Present **or**
 - HIST 1051 – East Asia since 1600 **or**
 - HIST 1061 – World History: 1400 to Present **or**
 - HIST 2051 – 20th Century Global Conflicts and Crisis
- Human Geography: (*choose one*)
 - GEOG 1023 – Human/Cultural Geography **or**
 - GEOG 1031 – World Regional Geography
- Cultural Pluralism/Diversity in the U.S.: (*choose one*)
 - SOC 2051 – Sociology of Race and Ethnicity **or**
 - SOC 1020 – Introduction to Sociology
 - POLS 1031 – American Government

Content Area 5: Communication Arts and Literature

- First year writing:
 - ENGL 1021 – Composition I
- Contemporary literature: international perspectives: (*choose one*)
 - ENGL 2032 – British Literature: Romantic to Present **or**
 - ENGL 2051 – Modern World Literature **or**
 - ENGL 2052 – Contemporary World Literature
- One elective from the following areas is required: art, dance, music, philosophy, or theater.

Content Area 6: Second Language

- One year of college-level second language or American Sign Language is highly recommended prior to admission

Family Social Science

Admission to this major requires a minimum 2.00 GPA, completion of high school intermediate algebra **or** Math 0070 – Intermediate Algebra, and completion of at least 1 social science course. The following courses are strongly recommended, but not required, prior to admission.

First-Year Writing

- ENGL 1021 – Composition I

Mathematics

- MATH 1025 – Statistics

Public Speaking

- COMM 1021 – Fundamentals of Public Speaking

Economics (*choose one*)

- ECON 1021 – Macroeconomics **or**
- ECON 1023 – Microeconomics

Social Studies

PSYC 1020 – General Psychology is preferred. However, students can choose a course from Anthropology **or** Psychology **or** Sociology **or** Political Science

Human Resource Development

Admission to this major requires a minimum 2.50 GPA and 60 semester credits completed or in progress at the time of application. The following courses are strongly recommended, but not required, prior to admission.

First-Year Writing

- ENGL 1021 – Composition I

Mathematics (*choose one*)

- MATH 1025 – Statistics **or**
- MATH 1061 – College Algebra I **or**
- Other college-level math

Public Speaking

- COMM 1021 – Fundamentals of Public Speaking

Social Science

- ECON 1021 – Macroeconomics **or** ECON 1023 – Microeconomics
- PSYC 1020 – General Psychology

Kinesiology

Admission to this major requires a minimum 2.50 GPA and 60 semester credits. Students are required to have 4 of the 5 following courses completed or in progress:

Biology with a lab

- BIOL 1041 – Introductory Biology I

Chemistry with a lab

- CHEM 1041 – Principles of Chemistry I

Physics with a lab (*choose one*)

- PHYS 1041 – General Physics I **or**
- PHYS 1081 – Introductory Physics I

Anatomy (*choose one*) ****students benefit from taking this course at the U. If you are planning on physical therapy, you will need to take an additional anatomy course****

- BIOL 2031 – Human Anatomy and Physiology I **or**
- BIOL 2032 – Human Anatomy and Physiology II

Introduction to Kinesiology – take this at the U

If you do not have access to anatomy and/or introduction to kinesiology, please note that in your application, and complete the three courses below

The following courses are strongly recommended, but not required, prior to admission:

Psychology

- PSYC 1020 – General Psychology

Speech

- COMM 1021 – Fundamentals of Public Speaking

Mathematics (*choose one*)

- MATH 1025 – Statistics **or**
- MATH 1061 – College Algebra I **or**
- Other college-level math

Recreation, Park and Leisure Studies

Admission to this major requires a minimum 2.00 GPA and 30 semester credits completed or in progress at the time of application.

Student must complete the following course prior to application:

General Psychology

- PSYC 1020

The following courses are strongly recommended, but not required, prior to admission.

- BMGT 2030 – Management Fundamentals
- ECON 1023 – Microeconomics (Commercial and Public also may take ECON 1021 – Macroeconomics)
- HLTH 1020 – Personal and Community Health
- POLS 1031 – American Government
- SOC 1020 – Introduction to Sociology
- COMM 1021 – Fundamentals of Public Speaking
- 3 physical education courses
- **Commercial track only:** ACCT 1010 – Introduction to Accounting

Sport Management

Admission to this major requires a minimum 2.0 GPA and 60 semester credits completed or in progress at the time of application. The following course is required prior to admission:

- PE 2080 – Introduction to Sport Management

The following courses are strongly recommended, but not required, prior to admission.

- PSYC 1020 – General Psychology
- SOC 1020 – Introduction to Sociology
- COMM 1021 – Fundamentals of Public Speaking
- HLTH 1020 – Personal and Community Health
- 3 physical education courses

Youth Studies

Admission to this major requires a minimum 2.00 GPA. Completion of the following courses is strongly recommended, but not required, prior to admission.

Social Science

- SOC 1020 – Introduction to Sociology
- Additional social science course: (*choose one*)
 - POLS 1020 – Introduction to Political Science **or**
 - PSYC 1020 – General Psychology **or**
 - GEOG 1023 – Human/Cultural Geography **or**
 - GEOG 1031 – World Regional Geography **or**
 - ANTH 1023 – Introduction to Anthropology: Culture

- MATH 1025 – Statistics

Public Speaking

- COMM 1021 – Fundamentals of Public Speaking
