Unlike other types of college credit, students that earn Articulate college credits are responsible for

- Printing and keeping their individual course completion record
- Submitting the articulated credit forms at the college **AFTER** applying to the college

ARTICULATED COLLEGE CREDIT

In Minnesota, articulated college credit courses are college courses offered at the high school, taught by a high school teacher. The courses are offered in partnership with a career or technical (sometimes referred to as a two year) college. Students do not leave their high schools to enroll in these college classes.

Articulated credit partnerships are formed in career and technical education programs, allowing students to explore college credit coursework in areas like health care, manufacturing, business, information technology and others.

Students do NOT earn a transcript but must request that these credits be applied to their career or technical college program **AFTER** they select a college and enroll.

Research shows that high school students who participate in early college credit opportunities benefit from:

- exposure to the rigor of a college course
- saving money on the cost of college
- reducing the time to earn a college degree because they earned college credits while still in high school

Earning Articulated College Credit while in high school, prepares students for greater success in college programs and the world of work. Students practice real world skills and apply them to work based scenarios.

Participating high schools also reap the benefits of sponsoring articulated college credit courses. Partnerships developed between college faculty and high school teachers provide learning and training opportunities that may not otherwise exist.
